



Suggested Timeline – English 11, Part 1

All our courses are **self-paced**; students can take this course over a minimum period of 30 days or over the course of a year. Many students take the course over the summer, while others take it over a semester. The timeline below assumes the course is being taken over a regular semester of 18 weeks. If you want to take this over the summer, adjust the timeline, do 2-3 weeks of work per week, and complete the course in 6-9 weeks.

To complete this course over one semester (18 weeks), you should aim to complete a unit every 2-3 weeks and spend 4 hours a week on the course. Remember, every student is different; if you start to fall behind schedule, increase your weekly study time. The course will expire a year after enrollment. You may petition for an extension; a \$50 fee will apply if approved. If you don't complete the course, you can request to drop it.

IMPORTANT – If your school gives you a date for the course to be completed, you must follow their deadline.
